## Lucius Q. Hitchcox

Lucius Q. Hitchcox was the youngest of eleven children born to Jarvis and Loana Hitchcox. He was born Aug., 1845 at Union, Mich. and died Feb. 23, 1925 at his home in Cassopolis, Mich.

In 1863 he enlisted in the Union Army in the 18 th Mich. Inft.. Co. A and served his country 2 years 1 month and 2 days. After his discharge from the service he returned to Union and resumed his occupation of farming. On Apr. 29, 1869 he was married to Sarah C. Jones who survives him. He is also survived by a daughter Ailene, living at home.

At the time of his marriage he moved to a farm near Baldwin Lake resort where he lived until 1919 when he sold out and moved to Cassopolis, Mich. Funeral services were held at the home with burial in Prospect Hill Cemetery,

## Thomas Miller Sears

oldest child of William and Margaret Miller Sears was born on the Sears homestead just west of Cassopolis, Mar. 10, 1841 and was one of nine children of whom one, Frank Sears, survives. He was married in 1868 to Miss Adaline Goodrich. Neither of their children survive. His first wife having died, he married Miss Nellie Peck April 4, 1882. Two sons and a daughter are still living, Clyde and Charles of Niles and Miss Bessie Tase of Jackson. There are also 8 grand children and 2 great grand children.

Mr. Sears was a farmer in his active years and a resident of La Grange township the greater part of his life. He was one of the first rural carriers out of Cassopolis, retiring after 15 y years of service.

He enlisted in Co. D, 6 th Mich. Inft, in March 1862 serving as a corporal until discharged Aug. 20, 1865. He was a member of Albert Henderson Post, No. 157, G.A.R.

## Henry Clay Walker,

son of Lucius and Linda Walker, was born in La Grange Co., Ind., Sept. 13, 1841 and passed away from this life Feb. 18, 1926 at the age of 84 years 5 months and 5 days.

On Aug. 8, 1862 he went to Fort Wayne and enlisted in Co. I, 88 th Ind. Inft. and served under Gen. Rosecrans. In Jan. 1863 he was discharged on account of serious illness. A few years
